“Praying Like a Child”

¹⁴ Let the children come to me; do not hinder them, for to such belongs the kingdom of God. ¹⁵ Truly, I say to you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God like a child shall not enter it. ¹⁶ And he took them in his arms and blessed them, laying his hands on them. (Mark 10:14–16 ESV)

“I thank you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, that you have hidden these things from the wise and understanding and revealed them to little children; yes, Father, for such was your gracious will. (Luke 10:21 ESV)

Last Wednesday, I was in a good discussion of Paul Miller's book, *A Praying Life*. We worked through the first part, which talks about praying like a child. Jesus commends childlike faith. We want to come before the Lord humbly, trustingly, admitting our need and our utter dependence upon Him. How does this kind of faith affect our prayers?

Children are good at sharing what's on their mind. They usually don't hold back, even when we might wish they would! There is an honesty, an unguardedness that many of us need in prayer. We are easily inhibited by our efforts to get our prayer right. We measure our words carefully, trying to say just the right things and in the right way.

I don't want to suggest for a moment that we should encourage selfish or ungodly prayers. We certainly don't want to do that. But in our effort to “get it right,” we are tempted to hide our true thoughts and feelings from God. Of course, that is impossible to pull off. He knows us fully. Our hearts are open to Him. But our pretending creates a barrier to coming to the Lord as a child. Miller writes:

Jesus does not say, “Come to me, all you who have learned how to concentrate in prayer, whose minds no longer wander, and I will give you rest.” No, Jesus opens His arms to His needy children and says, “Come to Me, all who are weary and heavy-laden, and I will give you rest” (Matthew 11:28, NASB). The criteria for coming to Jesus is weariness. Come overwhelmed with life. Come with your wandering mind. Come messy...Don't try to get the prayer right; just tell God where you are and what's on your mind. That's what little children do.

It helps me to see that my distractions are worries are not so much obstacles but springboards. They reveal my neediness and show me what I should bring to the Lord in prayer.

What a joyful blessing it is to have a Heavenly Father who loves us and welcomes us to come and cast our burdens upon Him. I pray that He will give us all grace to meet with Him in pray regularly, thankfully, humbly, and as His beloved little children.
